Sponsors 1st Varsity Home Game, Seeks Community Awareness


On September 10, 2004 Northgate High School played their first varsity home football game in the 30 year history of the school. One of the game sponsors was a group

sponsors was a group called the Northgate Community Pride Foundation. The Foundation's goals include an initiative to bring awareness to the community about the need to improve educational, athletic and performing arts facilities at Northgate High School. As

a result, they co-sponsored the pre-season varsity game in which Northgate had the home advantage over Piedmont. The free admission game was a huge success bringing a full house of community supporters.

Each class showed it's support by being present and providing food conces-

sions as a fundraising effort. Northgate Community Pride Foundation hopes to show students and the community what it could be like to have regular home games on their own turf.



For the students, this would mean less driving to Antioch and Mt. Diablo High School for games. Often these students are driving on the dangerous roads late at night after a long day. These neighborhoods aren't the most favorable and do not provide adequate lighting. Simply put, the students would be much safer attending at

least half of the seasons games (their home games) on the grounds of Northgate High School. The opportunity to have football games on campus, would also give Northgate stu-

> dents a sense of pride and boost school spirit and morale.

Having home games "at home" would be huge for the community as well. It would create a gathering place where the community could go to share school

pride and friendship. Imagine how fun it would be to drive just around the corner to see your child score his first touchdown or chant her first cheer. Safety Alert:

School is Back in Session

The faculty, parents and students of Valle Verde Elementary ask that you please use extra caution around the school campus.

Valle Verde has 560 students coming and going each morning and afternoon; many of these walk to school. Be sure to make complete stops at all stop signs and beware of children crossing the road at any street corner.



Also drive slow and watch carefully in front of the school, as it is a loading/unloading zone and many students are getting in and out of vehicles.

The Woodlands: A "Desirable" Neighborhood

When our family relocated to Walnut Creek and began house hunting, we came across many home descriptions that read "located in the desirable Woodlands neighborhood." After viewing several homes in the Woodlands, we agreed that it was indeed a desirable neighborhood.

There are many factors that determine whether or not a neighborhood remains on the desirable list. As residents, we must all do our part to keep the Woodlands a comfortable, safe and appealing area to live in.

Yards: Recently, it has been very warm. When you notice the temperature rising, be sure to water your yard more often. Watering in the morning is suggested because you will lose less water to evaporation and wind. When you water in the heat of the day or in the evening you risk plant damage through leaf burn and fungal infection. Also, watering in short intervals will enhance the saturation and lessen the extra runoff.

Curb appeal is the first thing fellow neighbors,

visitors, realtors and their clients will notice when driving through a neighborhood. We want to keep the Woodlands curb appeal in top notch condition. We can all contribute to excellent curb appeal by keeping the grass mowed and curbs edged. Trimming trees and shrubs will also make a difference. The Woodlands will attract future homeowners who care about their yards and homes if we give a first impression of "Wow!"

Boats, RV's, Vehicles, etc:

Having boats, RV's, and vehicles parked on the street or even in your driveway for a couple of days can be an eyesore to many. Street storage is actually prohibited in Walnut Creek. It portrays a community as not having residents that care.

Home Exterior Maintenance:

Every few years check the status of your exterior paint. How does the paint look? Would it look fresher and protect my home better if I put on a new coat? Also, check the status of your roof, fence, rain gutters, and siding. Using a pressure

washer can make a huge difference in appearance for many exterior variables of the home.

Safety: I've noticed that Citrus has become the Indy 500. Ok, maybe that was a bit of an exaggeration, but I have noticed a tremendous amount of speedy driving down the main thoroughfares of our neighborhood. We have a lot of walkers, joggers and children in the area. Please slow down and remember that the pedestrians in The Woodlands are your neighbors.

Other notes on safety are to keep your car doors and homes locked to defer crime. It's also a good idea to let your neighbors know when you will be away for any length of time so they can be alert to happenings around your home while you are gone.

There are numerous tips and suggestions that could be included in this article. This is simply intended to get us thinking about our "desirable neighborhood" and maintaining that status quo.
